5. Trim the edges and decorate as desired.

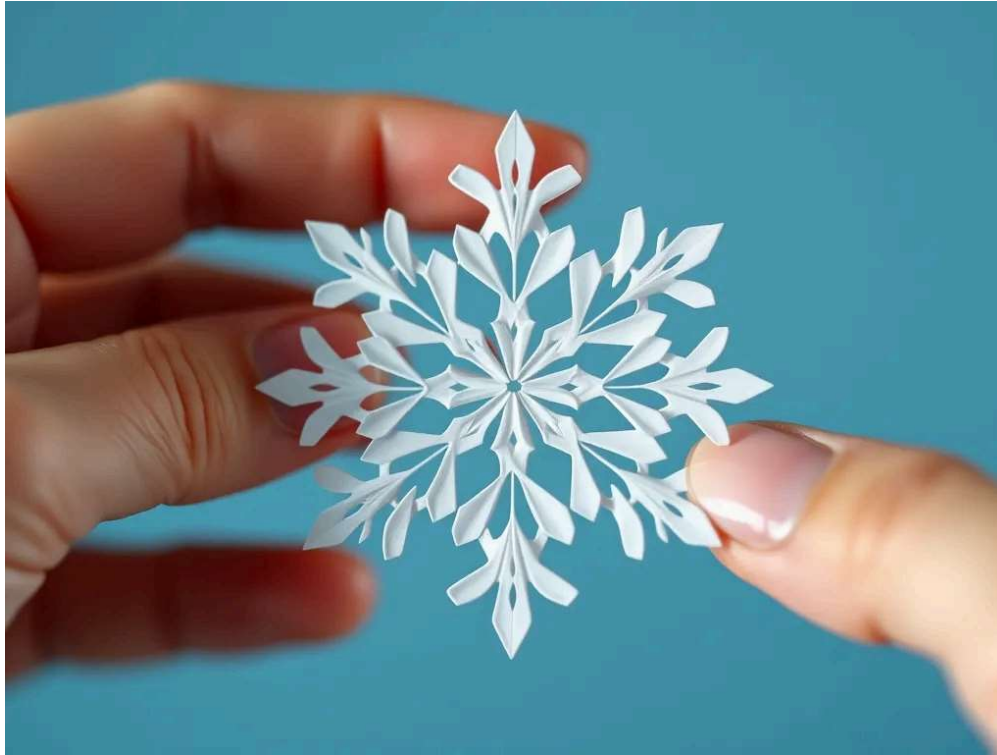
Fun Fact:
